WHO CAN PARTICIPATE?

Bannock, Bear Lake, Bingham, Butte, Caribou, Oneida, Power & Franklin County residents who are pregnant or have children birth to five years of age.

HOW DOES IT WORK

Parents as Teachers is a **FREE** parent education program. Families can participate by meeting with a parent educator in person or virtually.

Personal Visits

Since this is your child and your family, you set the agenda for each personal visit. Your parent educator is there to provide well-researched information to help you make good parenting decisions and to provide encouragement and support in time of need.

Groups

Group connections also create a network for you & other parents to learn and support each other and grow together as parents.

Screenings

Regular screenings during your visits will make sure your child is healthy, safe & developing on track.

Resources

Your parent educator will make the introduction and connect you to additional resources in your community.
